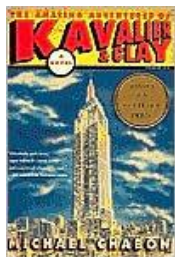

She sends Jacob roaming across a war-torn landscape to encounter a marvelous variety of characters, each imagined with empathy and depth. The relatively conventional storytelling here is quite different from the kaleidoscopic narrative techniques Horn employed in her previous books, *In the Image* and *The World to Come*, but her scope is just as ambitious, her talents as prodigious as ever.”

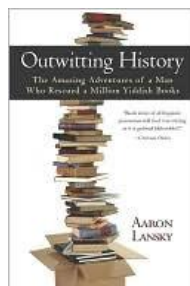

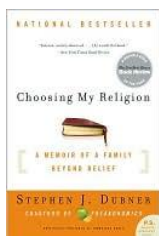
